Dear Parents and Carers,

This September we celebrated the official opening of our new school building by Sr. Claire Sykes, FCJ General Superior. We reflected on the long history of FCJ education in Somers Town, this being the first school set up by Marie Madeleine D'Houet in England when she arrived in 1830. This year we also celebrate the Bi-Centenary of the founding of the FCJ order in 1820; first we marked a 'Day of Kindness' with all FCJ schools across the world on Friday 21st September, Marie Madeleine's birthday.

On Founders' Day all students were presented with a special prayer book 'The Faithfulness of God'; these contain a prayer for each day of the year, prepared by the FCJ sisters. The pupils were given time to reflect on Marie Madeleine's mission and prayers from the booklet on significant dates for them, such as their birthday. The second half of the day was our annual sponsored walk around Regents Park; a total of £2,633.30 was raised for The Passage Homeless charity and The Catholic Children's Society.

We look forward to future events to mark the Bi-Centenary in the New Year, including a drama presentation based on Marie Madeleine's life, in the Spring.

Careers Information for Parents News Letter December 2019

Expanded Provision for Careers, PSHE and Citizenship: Five off-curriculum 'theme' days have now been planned within the academic year in order to offer more provision and also to introduce students in Years 7 to 10 to Unifrog which is already being used in the Sixth Form so that they can log what they have done during these days and progress can be tracked through the year. The Year 8s will have a Careers Day on the 6th February 2020 with Financial Literacy sessions arranged by Deloitte and sessions from Career Ready and our teaching staff to help them prepare for their Options in March. We are also introducing special career related workshops for SEN students with the help of Costain Skanska and hope to offer KS3 and 4 more career talks through the year. The London Enterprise Adviser Network (LEAN) assigned to us a new enterprise advisor called Rod Dubitsky. This should be in the first paragraph where I mention more theme days for Careers.

Career Day Tuesday November 26th 2019: The Year 7s 'Careers' Day on Tuesday November 26th included a Financial Literacy Workshop run by Deloitte and sessions on Engineering, Design, the Commercial sector and Interview Skills and Networking run by Costain Skanska. Do please ask your children about these sessions and encourage them to write down what they have learnt in relation to future careers and how their work at school gives them the skills that they can use in the world of work.

9A trip to the New College of the Humanities Friday 8th November 2019: 9A took part in a workshop at NCJ run by The Transformation Trust in partnership with Dell where they joined students from another school and were put into groups. There was a brief presentation on Law and the purpose of Law and a talk about advances in Technology. The students were told that they had landed on an island with plenty of supplies to keep going but would need to organise themselves as a society choosing the laws and technology necessary for co-existence. They had to prepare a presentation on the Dell laptops provided for each group and speak briefly about their ideas in front of all the students and volunteers from the University. A mixture of scenarios both serious and comic entertained us: punishments for breaking rules including in some cases cutting off fingers and toes. In comparison school punishments appear very civilised indeed. We even had a dictatorship in action when the concept of a holy camel as the ruling force of one island was imposed on a group in spite of dissenters.

Deloitte Group Mentoring for Year 10s and 11s. An introductory session took place this term for interested Year 10s and 11s and there will be monthly sessions of an hour from 3.00 to 4.00pm on a Thursday that will cover the following topics: **16.01.20**: **Post-school landscape -** What are the post-GCSE paths (e.g. A Levels, college, university, apprenticeships etc.), benefits to a gap year, challenging obstacles to achieving ambitions:

27.02.20: Introductions and interview - Preparing for an interview, how to introduce yourself, making a good first impression, practice interview questions

19.03.20: *Effective presentation* - What makes a good presenter, developing presentation skills and addressing presenting challenges e.g. body language, managing nerves, framing the presentation, answering questions,

23.04.2: Resilience and adaptability - Understanding the difference between school and post-school environments, how to adapt to change (e.g. going away to university, being in the workplace), life skills development (e.g. time management, self-discipline), building resilience to change and how to manage difficulties.

Speakers for Schools

We are hosting a talk by Matthew Reed, CEO of Marie Curie, who will be addressing the Year 10s on January 16th 2020.

Kanbar Hossein Bor, Deputy High Commissioner for Bangladesh spoke to a group of Sixth Formers on the 1st November and a very interesting discussion took place about his mother moving to England, his upbringing here, studying Law and then moving to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. We hope he will stay in touch with the school.

Speakers for Schools are improving their work experience platform so I hope we will be able to make more use of the opportunities that they offer.

Work Experience: Year 12s will be starting to do work experience placements during either the February half term, a week in the Easter Holidays, May half term, the last week of the Summer Term or Summer Holidays, though there are one or two students who have managed to find their own placements over the Christmas break. We would be very grateful if parents are able to help their daughters and sons find a placement to expand what I can offer from my database. We would like to encourage students to research possibilities, prepare CVs and then email providers who are more likely to respond if they have some information about the student and will appreciate the student showing some knowledge of the company or organisation.

1) A group of students have been selected by Ted Baker to take part in a challenge by Ted Baker that looks at how to revive Britain's high streets. We were able to present our findings and ideas to some of the most important people in the company.

*Model United Nations: students meet weekly to discuss issues such as climate change, human trafficking and the state of modern politics.

*Debate club- students from years 7 and 8 have been meeting to prepare for a debate championship in February.

4) A trip to Oxford is being organised for some of our More Able pupils for 30th January. This is organised by Oxford University and should prove to be an exciting day for our students.

Berlin / Auschwitz trip - July 2019



Miss Speller, Mr Coombes & Miss Henderson accompanied 25 Year 10, Year 11 & Year 12 students to Berlin from 1st-4th July. The trip was enjoyed by all: new friendships were made, words in new languages learned, and superb weather appreciated!

In the words of Reyah (Y12):

The trip to Berlin and Kraków was short but sweet. The fact that it was relatively short meant that there was no time to waste and each student that came along had to appreciate every piece of architecture they saw, every bite of food they took and every step they took on hallowed ground...before the moment was over!

After a very early start at Heathrow, we finally arrived in Berlin where we caught a glimpse into the very socialist life of East Germans, upon a trip to the DDR museum, in the heart of the 'Museumsinsel', which is a very important part of what makes Berlin. Following this, we took a walk through the city in the heat and admired the edifices of Berlin as we made our way to Checkpoint Charlie...another prized piece of history that shapes the city. The duration of our time in Berlin was spent sightseeing – we visited well-known tourist attractions like the Reichstag, the Brandenburger Tor and Alexanderplatz, where we spent 3 long hours enjoying the city, shopping for souvenirs and trying German delicacies like Currywurst and Berliners! One of the highlights of our time in Berlin was most definitely our ascension to the top of the Fernsehturm, where we fully got to appreciate the city in all its beauty and clearly see the effects of a key point in history – the east-west divide, through seeing the differences in the buildings of the city.

With a 6am start the following day, we slept our lives away along a bumpy highway on the coach to a whole new city. After 7 hours, we finally made it to the beautiful city of Kraków. We were greeted by a friendly tour guide who took us all around the city and showed us the key parts of the heritage there, such as the Wawel Castle and the Collegium Luridicum, whilst teaching some students Polish along the way. This was followed by a pleasant evening meal of traditional Polish food (tradycyjne polskie potrawy) back at the hotel. The next day, which was sadly the last day of the trip, was a very humbling day for most, with a trip to Auschwitz-Birkenau, the place where over 1 million people met their tragic death under Hitler. The aspects of the Auschwitz Museum really put into perspective just how spine-chilling this era of history was and how many people it truly affected. Although distressing, this part of the trip was definitely a once-in-a-lifetime experience! The afternoon was spent enjoying the city of Kraków, where some students decided to ride electric scooters through the town centre, whilst others preferred to spend some time by the lake and absorb the atmosphere...which brought us to the end of our time in Poland, and the end of a very enjoyable trip.

Durch den Besuch des Brandenburger Tores, des Reichstages und des Fernsehturmes ist es jetzt einfacher geworden, den Kontext meines Studiums zu verstehen, da ich den Unterschied in der Landschaft Westdeutschlands und Ostdeutschlands mit meinen eigenen Augen von oben der Turm sehen konnte. Die Reise nach Auchzwitz hat mir geholfen, mich mit den Juden und ihren Erlebnissen während des Holocausts vertraut zu machen und hat mir die Augen geöffnet, warum Deutschland so wie heute ist - zum Beispiel gibt es heute das Holocaust-Mahnmal im Herzen Berlins. Diese Reise hat nicht nur meine Ausbildung verbessert, sondern auch meine Liebe zur deutschen Kultur vertieft, indem sie mich neuen Dingen ausgesetzt hat. Ich durfte mit Deutschen interagieren und deutsche Köstlichkeiten wie Currywurst und Berliner probieren ... Dinge, die ich vor dieser Reise wahrscheinlich nicht getan hätte.

Abesalat (Y10), who studies French, also impressively kept a diary whilst on the trip, an excerpt of which we have included below:

08h45 : Je suis arrivée au rez-de-chaussée et Mademoiselle Speller était énervée ! J'avais peur !


13h30 : Nous avons visité le Reichstag et le Brandenburger Tor. Nous sommes restés jusqu'à 16h00.

FCJ Social Justice Project

As part of the FCJ Bicentenary celebrations, Maria Fidelis' Sixth Form Leadership Team, along with their counterparts from Gumley House, Upton Hall School and Bellerive, have come up with social justice projects that they are putting into action in the school.

Aiseosa (Head Girl) explains:

Over the last couple of weeks the newly-appointed members of the student leadership team have been working on two social justice projects. This includes working to support rough sleepers (and reduce the stigma) whilst simultaneously aiming to introduce a zero waste canteen in the school.

The first project would involve distributing bags which contain hygiene products and non-perishable foods around the area. The student leadership team have written to various businesses in order to request for financial assistance. Businesses such as Ted Baker are willing to help, with donations coming in from other local businesses too.

The zero-waste canteen has involved meeting with Caterlink, the catering provider for Maria Fidelis, which has allowed the team to suggest ways of significantly reducing waste. The school's Business Manager, Ms Ewins, attended the meetings. As a result Caterlink have agreed to allow hot and cold leftover food to be given to Euston Foodbank and using a compost bin.

We aim to launch both projects officially in September.

Keir Starmer visit – 14th June

On 14th June, Y10 and Y12 attended a talk given by Sir Keir Starmer, who is our local MP (for Holborn & St Pancras) and Shadow Secretary for Brexit (Lab). Students grilled him on a range of topics, from his time as a lawyer acting in the McLibel case, to his time as an MP – even answering a question on whether he would challenge Jeremy Corbyn to be leader of the Labour Party if there were a Labour leadership contest similar to that of the Conservatives!



Speakers for Schools high profile talks



Through Speakers for Schools, the Sixth Form had a talk from Rachel Jupp, the Editor of BBC's Panorama, in May. Rachel discussed the ethical and moral challenges she faces in her role, as well as some of the dangerous and libellous cases she's taken on. The students were captivated and there may be many a journalist inspired after the talk!

We also had a talk from the Rt. Hon. Lady Nichola Mendelsohn, CEO of Facebook in Europe, the Middle East & Africa, and "the most powerful woman in the British tech industry", according to the Daily Telegraph. She spoke about her career, and answered questions about her role in the Jewish community, in the Labour party and as a mum of four! 


A-level results 2019

Other destinations included the Universities of Kent, Coventry, Northampton, Brunel, Queen Mary, Cardiff, Roehampton and London Met.


Only one student has decided not to accept a university place and take a gap year, and one is doing an apprenticeship.

The Smiles Campaign

This project is led by half of our Student Leadership Team. It involves distributing tote bags which contain hygiene products, sanitary items and non-perishable foods to rough sleepers around the area. The girls will assemble the bags and distribute them themselves; this was based on an idea by their friend Tahiyat Khan, who Ms Speller nominated for a Jack Petchey Award in 2017 for a smaller-scale version of this project.



In October, the girls in the Leadership Team working on the Smiles Campaign pitched their ideas to the Urban Partners Executive Committee, which was composed of representatives from local business such as LNER, HS1, HS2, St Pancras Hotel Group, Eurostar, Springer Nature, Lendlease, Argent, Ted Baker, The Guardian, The Office Group, Green & Fortune and Havas. This was a big challenge for the girls but they rose admirably to it, as well as answering some seriously difficult questions, and in so doing secured £1000 in funding from the UP Board. This is an enormous achievement. They also managed to persuade Havas to print the tote bags for them, and all businesses are now also donating items to go into the Smiles bags.

In addition, Lendlease were so impressed that they offered to run a professional project management style 3-week course for the team, which includes financial budgeting among other things.

There is a donations box in Reception and the students also delivered assemblies to all year groups to encourage them to get involved with our Smiles Campaign.





At the beginning of this month, donations collected by the businesses started arriving:

On the 16th October, we attended to a talk by Mrs Cherie Blair CBE QC at Harrow School. It was a fantastically enlightening and enriching experience where she discussed her passion for the topic 'Women and Education' to students across the whole of North London.

After hearing her wonderful words, I delved into the depths of modern and past inequality in women, how they are treated in their line of work today, and their virtual 'expulsion' from opportunities that men are 'more entitled' to even in modern day society; I was able to learn about the injustice that they faced, and face, on an academic and human scale.

Gently and gracefully, she discussed the notable achievements of various women from the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, including the likes of Florence Nightingale and Ellen Johnson Sirleaf. Her impassioned speech called us to create change for how women should be treated by being given the same opportunities, particularly in the world of work but also in life in general, in a manner that was nothing less than inspiring.

Her talk was uplifting, and has encouraged me to learn more about topics and problems in the world such as these, which I hope will be improved in the future by the youth of today, so ably inspired by voices such as Mrs Blair's today.

Two Y12 students head to Auschwitz

Meadow & Tory (Y12) were lucky enough to win places on the Lessons from Auschwitz project. Before a day trip to the infamous death camp, they had a day's workshop in which they explored themes surrounding the Holocaust. Meadow wrote us her account below:

My Auschwitz visit was a real eye-opener to say the least. I know it sounds cliché to say that the visit opened my eyes but in all honesty I've never really taken on-board the real consequences of what happened to these people. I am very grateful to the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project for giving me the opportunity to visit this place where so many innocent lives were taken from this world, as I feel I gained a real connection to the individuals persecuted by the Nazis; not just the '6 million' that we hear of in the classroom.

From the outset, I felt the dark atmosphere surrounding us in the camp. The feeling of our footfalls on the stones being only the shadows of those who walked barefoot whilst their feet began to blister was traumatizing. I could only think of the mothers who could not help, let alone heal, their children and the elderly who could hardly walk as it was alongside the cuts on their feet with the Nazis pointing their guns and shouting for the herds to hurry up. We reached a point where in the distance I could see the entrance reading the words 'Arbeit Macht Frei' in English meaning 'work will set you free'; unfortunately, this could not be further from the truth and the further we walked I got the impression the further away from freedom we were getting. Ironically, we were just visiting and yet I felt like I was trapped in the walls separating man from man - after all we are all people. The exclusion from the general public was the stepping stone for the Nazis to turn a man into a beast but also another man into an animal, a scavenger that would do anything for a piece of bread. The separation between luxury and necessity turned into a very fine line between these walls and I almost felt guilty for eating my dinner that night and leaving that what I didn't want, as my scraps would've been another's treasure.

I feel very emotionally connected to the Holocaust since my visit and I've been really interested in finding out more. I'm currently reading a book called 'The Tattooist of Auschwitz' and watched a film called 'The Pianist'; it again reminded me of the individuals that were tragically a part of this monstrosity. The titles themselves show that these people could 'tattoo' and play the piano; they were humans and they walked and talked, got hungry and thirsty, celebrated birthdays and Christmas just like the rest of us with just one major difference; a huge majority of them died due to one man's anger and hatred. On the flip side, we must take into consideration the persecutors who were also humans with emotions. The persecutors alongside the persecuted were normal people with families and it's a thrilling thought that the same ingenuity and intellect that built these great trains that travelled from a wide spread of destinations in Europe, and those architects that designed these great buildings, when flipped on the side of evil, were able to create a train that people paid to get on into a camp of death (allegedly paying for their own death). The architects that built these gas chambers that killed hundreds of people within twenty minutes withheld the intelligence of creating buildings that people admire, yet they chose to use this intelligence for the good of evil. In this way, they are responsible, though not directly involved in persecuting the Jews; they are partly to blame for the death of mothers, brothers, grandparents etc. This experience was key in highlighting this for me because I never really thought of it this way, in the classroom we only learn about.

the Nazis and we haven't much time to think about all the others involved in the death of the Jews.

A survivor of the Holocaust, Elie Weisel, once said, 'To hear a witness, you are now a witness' and after hearing a testimony from Eve Kegler I feel as though it is now my duty to educate those on the lives of the Jews and not just the number but the individuals that left their glasses and keys behind that still remain behind the cabinet glass at the camp - and because of this, they will be remembered. I know it is impossible to remember 6 million people but what I ask is that you find the links between you and them and once you have, they will be remembered. For example, if you have a sister or a mother or a father you love dearly, you can find a link between yourself and the families who slept on wooden beds with a hunger far worse than an empty fridge and in this way they are being remembered. Leaving the camp, the cold chill that hit us in puffer jackets with our layers underneath was only a fraction of the snow/winds that killed these beaten people in stripped pyjamas.

The LFA project is so important and I highly recommend it as it inspires those to remember, after all 'those who do not remember the past are condemned to repeat it'.
